

Understanding How to Measure ELL: Evaluating Different Indicators of ELL

Students' Self-Reported English Language Usage, by ELL Survey Item



A random sample of students who took the ACT® test in April 2016 was invited to participate in an online survey about their English Language Learner (ELL) status (N = 52,500). A total of 10,336 students responded. Students were asked to answer five ELL items from national sources, 1 each listed in the figure above.

Kev Takeaways

- The percentage of students who self-reported as English speakers varied depending on how the concept was measured. For example, 95% of survey respondents indicated English was the language easiest for them to speak, but fewer students (90%) indicated English was the language they used most often at home.
- The language most commonly spoken in the home may be different than the language easiest to use when speaking. While 95% of the students reported English as their easiest language, fewer students (84%) reported that English was the language most commonly spoken at home.
- Similar percentages of students reported that English was the language first learned (86%) and that English was the language their parents used most frequently when speaking to them (85%). This is not surprising, since the first language learned is often used by the parents.
